THE funeral of Frank Horne was held on Thursday at All Saints' Church, Rampton, conducted by the Rev Michael Drury.

The organist was Mrs Felicity Ferriter and the hymns sung were 'The Lord's my Shepherd' and 'The Day Thou Gavest'.

The popularity of Frank was shown by the large number of people who attended the service. He was very friendly, kind and generous.

Mr Horne died in Bassetlaw General Hospital following a stroke. He was born in Laneham but spent most of his life in Rampton.

He was a high quality family butcher and served his apprenticeship with Mr Tom Quickfall. When Mr Quickfall died, Frank took over the business. He was renowned for his sausages and pork pies, and supplied many shops in Retford and the surrounding villages, also Lincolnshire.

He gave generously to the church and was at one time on the Parochial Church Council and a sidesman.

He was a good friend of students in the area, transporting them to and from college when they had no other means of getting there.

Mr Horne served in the Army during the Second World War, his wife looking after the business. He loved his garden and enjoyed a day at the races.

He leaves a sister and three brothers, his wife having predeceased him seven years ago.

Burial followed in Rampton churchyard.
